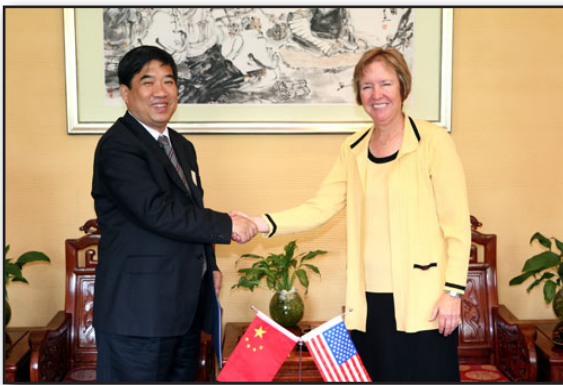
Academic Dean of Tampa University Visits UIBE and Signs a Memorandum of Understanding

Doctor Janet McNew, Academic Dean, and Academic Vice-President of Tampa University accompanied by Doctor Jin Wang, Vice-Academic Dean visited UIBE on June 4, 2009. Vice president Lin Guijun met with the guests and signed a memorandum of understanding between UIBE and Tampa University.
